Definition

"Ability to find, understand, and use information presented through words, symbols, and images. For example, we use this skill to locate information on forms and drawings, and to read items such as emails, reports, news articles, blog posts and instructions."

Importance

"Helps you...

- to understand and interpret the meaning within the text.
- in day-to-day activities, such as understanding changes in travel advisories and interpreting the important messages in articles."

Task Description

This task deals with how Canadians govern themselves and the skill of reading.

In this task, we will cover the structure of the government. We will also learn reading strategies and how to use them.







Look for clues





Set a goal

When you set a goal, you figure why you are reading a text.



In this task, you are reading because you want to learn about how Canadians govern themselves or you need to understand how the government works.





Ask questions

Reading can get easier when you know what information you are looking for.



In this task, ask questions such as:

- -What information am I looking for?
- -What key words will help me find that information?





Look for clues

A clue is "something that guides". Texts contain helpful clues.



In this task, you can find clues in the table of contents, titles, headings, and pictures.

-constitutional monarchy.




Federal State

RESPONSIBILITIES

The keywords are *independent* and *shared responsibilities*.

-The government of Canada has 3 levels of government:



-Each level has different responsibilities.


-Territories have small populations, but their governments carry out the same functions as provinces.



Responsibilities Examples

Federal

- National Defence
- Canadian Citizenship
- Foreign Policy



Provincial

- Education
- •Health
- Driver's Licences



- •Fire Services
- Garbage Collection
- Public Transportation

Note:

Some powers are shared by the federal and provincial governments. For example:

- Immigration,
- Agriculture,
- Environment, and
- •Health.





Parliamentary Democracy

DETAILS

People elect members of the House of Commons.

Both the Senate and the House of Commons consider and review proposals for new laws. Bills need to be approved by both and received approval by the Governor General.

Parliament has 3 parts:

Sovereign

The king or queen is the head of the State.

Senate

There are 105 senators appointed by the General Governor.

House of

Commons

Called members of Parliament. There are 338 members.



Constitutional Monarchy

HEAD of STATE

The Sovereign is the *head of* state.

The Head of State does not rule but reigns in accordance with the Constitution.




His Majesty King Charles III is the current Head of State of Canada.

Canadians swear allegiance to the Sovereign.

Link the information you read to your life or what you have already known.


